hanks to a Calgarian with a vision, Alberta has now joined the ranks with British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Newfoundland and Labrador, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island in declaring the second Friday in July each year as Collector Car Appreciation Day, with this year's event held on July 14th.



Started in Saskatchewan in 1990, the concept was to have a a major low cost, fun-filled, not for profit rod run that is hosted by local car clubs for the benefit of local charities, and is shared between the Prairie Provinces on a 3 to 4 year rotation.

Through his guidance, the event has strived to make this an affordable family outing for spectators that encourages the love of cars in the young and rekindles the memories of past rides in the old and promotes the hay days of Rock and Roll music.

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

ike many guys, I have had a few pickups over the years but due to busy family and career choices I hadn't owned one for over ten years. Living on an acreage west of Elk Island Park, a pickup would have been handy, but wasn't in the cards.

A good friend of mine, Garry Drachenberg, approached me one day asking about the possibility of getting what had been his father's 1974 Chrysler Imperial back on the road. It had sat in a small garage for about 12 years and needed attention. To make a long story shorter, after about two months, a lot of help from my friend Darry Anderson, and over \$1000.00 in parts the white (with white vinyl top and white leather interior) Imperial was resurrected. To cover the labour, Garry agreed to "sell me" his dad's 1980 GMC Sierra Grande Heavy Half pickup.

Now I had my pickup. It was in good shape but well used. After using it for various jobs for about a year I decided to "perk it up a bit". With Darry's help I pulled the old 350 4 barrel out to discover that the camshaft was shot (two lobes completely missing) both heads were cracked and the crank was worn out. I dropped it off at E. C. Engine Rebuilders in Edmonton where they installed a strong RV cam, flat top pistons and a few other goodies. It took a couple of weeks for us to get everything back together but what a difference! About

double the horsepower it had when new. The turbo 400 automatic was fine so we proceeded to bend new two and a quarter inch dual exhaust pipes and installed a couple of cherry bombs. Once again I used the truck for about a year until I decided that the original two tone pant and the rust that started to become obvious had to go. In April of 2009, while on a road trip to the Portland Oregon swap meet, I picked up good box sides and front fenders for the 80 (at Big Toe Auto Wteckers), giving me a good start on planning the necessary bodywork. The following January, while at the SEMA show in Vegas I spotted the most amazing Candy Tangerine Metallic paint. Knowing full well that that my skills and the level of the paint job I was considering, were not even close, I started looking for the product when I got back to Alberta. Canada Car Color was able to supply the product. Three coats of gold metallic basecoat, three coats of candy tangerine over that and then three coats of clear coat. With the three coats of epoxy primer, we painted the truck 12 times! I then rolled on Rhino bed coating on the inside of the box, except for the original wood floor. It took a lot of work, lots of help from friends, and plenty of time putting in the glass and new parts ordered from LMC in Kansas but the 80 now has a new life. The orange is almost blinding in the bright sunlight. It isn't perfect but a pretty good job for a couple of amateurs in a garage. Hey, my wife, Diane even likes the truck now.

nual fall event, with the driving force being OCCA (Canada's longest running collector car auction); an internationally renowned venue in Spruce Meadows; the participation of fantastic local car club members; and a topnotch team (including the SVAA all of the superb car club volunteers over the years!), Horsepower is destined to become western Canada's premiere auto event.

He goes on to say that he looks forward to seeing all of the auction regulars as well as meeting new people participating in either the show and/or the auction.



The venue is perfect – large adjacent parking lots minimize walking between the participant and spectator areas, the indoor Equi-Plex provides a comfortable auction experience, tree-lined walking paths allow for a relaxing stroll, and green spaces with picnic tables make Spruce Meadows the ideal place for a day's outing.

This year the Calgary Thunderbird Club will be the featured organization, and their chosen charity will be the recipient of \$5 from each car show participant's registration fee. The club recognizes the growing needs of many charitable organizations and wants to select the one they feel will benefit the most from the proceeds, thus a decision will be forthcoming very soon.

The event runs 2 days; Friday, September 15th is the auction preview from 6-9 pm in the Equi-Plex, and on Saturday September 16th doors open at 9 am with the auction and car show starting at 10 am.

Clubs from Calgary and surrounding areas have been invited to participate in the show and shine, while the auction will

present 100 lots or more of

high quality cars and classic car memorabilia.

Admission for car club participants is \$20 and this includes admission to the auction, and \$25 for individuals who want to take part in the show but aren't affiliated with any specific club.

Admission for spectators is \$20 for adults, \$10 for kids 7-12, and free for kids under 6. Free parking and admission to the car show and auction is included in the price.

A bidder's card can be purchased for \$20, which gives access to special seating at floor level and provides a great close-up view of the vast selection of vehicles up for auction. For those unable to attend the auction in person, the website www.okotokscarauction.com will have online registration and bidding forms as well as information about the featured items.

which pump or button to push to get the proper mix in your vehicle. To make the decision harder, there are regular, flex fuel and "use only high octane" vehicles on the road these days. To further add to the confusion, different vendors sell fuels with confusing octane or ethanol mixes, or no information regarding either. If you really have a rare fuel requirement there are also many "snake"

oil" additives on the market to allow you to mix all sorts of lethal cocktails for your particular ride. The compression ratios of your engine used to drive the decision of which fuel to use (octane rating) in your vehicle.

Early vehicles compression ratios ranged from 4:1 up to 8:1 with high compression cylinder heads. Fuel octane was low or high, regular or premium - "orange or red" depending on the percentage of lead in the fuel to control "ping" or "knock". The addition of lead also prevented or reduced the frequency of burnt valves. Lead is no longer in auto fuel available at your local fuel pumps. Some aviation and racing fuels still use lead or similar additives to raise the octane values. Lead and other chemicals created severe pollution issues and were discontinued in every day gasolines.

New technology and engine design have overcome many of the engine problems of the past. Also new lubricating oils are custom designed to work with today's engines and fuels.

Newer vehicles clearly designate a recommended engine oil and fuel. The best policy is to follow the manufactures recommendations.

Now for antique 20's - 60's vehicles using original engines, regular or 85 octane fuel should be okay. Late 60's "muscle

cars" running high compression engines should use a high octane fuel (91 - 112). Timing may need to be adjusted to reduce "pinging" or "knocking" caused by preignition if the octane is lower than your requirements.

The new guy on the block is the ethanol additive in most gasoline's. Ethanol is added to fuel usually up to 15%. Most pumps in this country have a label on the front panel which says "may contain up to 10% ethanol". South of the boarder you may encounter several different mixtures of ethanol added to gasoline and may vary from state to state. Many

problems have arisen in the U.S.A. with ethanol augmented fuels. Corrosion of metal parts, deteriorated rubber parts and general destruction of fuel system components are blamed on ethanol fuels.



If you wish to use fuel which is ethanol free there are 27 outlets selling "pure gas" in Alberta. The names and locations of "pure gas" outlets are available at https://www.pure-gas.org/index.jsp?stateprov=AB. It should also be noted that using a high octane fuel in a vehicle with a low compression engine will cause no harm other than a thinner wallet.


The purpose of using ethanol mixed gasoline's is to reduce emissions. After reading the pros and cons of the blogs in the Hemmings articles it seems it would be up to the consumer to choose the best fuel for his or her vehicle. Unless the laws of the land make the choice for you in our future. Stay alert.

lubs are the cornerstone to the collector vehicle hobby. They are the place we gather, share information, plan, and spend time face-to-face with the like- minded individuals who share our passion for our vehicles. As President of the SVAA, I have met with many clubs in the past 16 months and there is one question that is always asked. "How do we attract new young members?".

"Young member" is a relative term. Look around our traditional car club and you will quickly notice that demographics are heavily weighted toward those who learned to drive a standard three-on-the-tree buying gas in gallons. The average age of many clubs is approaching 65 to 75 years old. For this article, young members are those under the age of 50.

Car Club or Meeting Club?

Clubs take many forms but the key to attracting and retaining young members is to keep the driving in the car club and avoid what happens all too often when the car club becomes the meeting club. The is nothing worse than walking into a club meeting for the first time, ready to take part, only to have to sit through a formal board style meeting where everything under the sun was talked about except the vehicles and the drives. Usually by the end of these meetings everyone is so exhausted from the bickering and non-driving banter that once the meeting is adjourned, it is a race for the exit, and not one bit of technical information or windy road story has been shared.

Tired Boards Need Fresh Tires

The other recurring theme at many clubs is an executive committee that has selflessly given countless hours of their time and have often sat for many consecutive terms because nobody steps up take their place. They dutifully carry on for the good of the club despite being completely burnt out. They have done their part and are desperate for some "young" blood to take the wheel and steer the club down new and innovative roads. The ice cream run has been overdone and it is time for some new ideas. Remember, a "young" board will attract "young" members.

Executive Committee Politics

The President and the executive committee was elected by the members. Trust them to do their job. Imagine a meeting where members show up, enjoyed a cold beverage and some snacks, heard a guest speaker or discussed the best way to repair some issue with the vehicles, all because the committee was left to do their job. Sure, let the President give a brief synopsis of what's new but let the politics stay within the committee.

If you don't like what the committee has accomplished in their term then let your opinions be heard at the next election or better yet be part of the change and get nominated and put your time in to effect the change that you want to see.

Enable committee and/or board members and members at large to take initiatives without going through exhaustive committees. Nothing stifles a great idea like the delay caused by waiting for the next committee meeting. Common sense prevails of course but trust and leeway to make decisions can be the reward for good judgement and decision making. Act on member's ideas swiftly and cut the red tape before the enthusiasm is gone.

You Get What You Give

When it comes to clubs, ask not what your club can do for you but what you can do for the club. They are truly a place where you get what you give. If you are taking on a leadership role don't expect anything in return. You are doing the job for your own fulfilment and the betterment of your local car community.

In order to be successful, clubs need new "young" members to carry the torch and new "young" members need to make themselves heard. Take a risk and express an opinion, even if goes against the grain.

Put In Some Sweat Equity

Many traditional car clubs today need a boost much like a stock that was once hot but needs the next big idea to get going again. Think of the annual membership dues as an investment in the future success of the organization. If you as a new member make an effort to be part of the change and put in some time and ideas, you very well may be able to produce the next big thing that the club needs to revisit or even surpass its past and present glory.

"Young" members have the ability to invest their skills in the club. You can volunteer to look after the club's website and social media account. Don't kid yourself, the "older" crowd will resist, citing a disdain for THE FACEBOOK and digital newsletters. Don't worry, once they see the attention and the fresh faces that it brings to the club they will come around and might even sign up. Remember that no change happened without someone taking a chance.

Youth Attracts Youth

If you are the new "young" member consider inviting a friend to a meeting. Yes. you might have to be one of the only "young" guys for a while but think of yourself as bait to attract other like-minded gear heads of your generation to join the club.

Get The Club Driving

Car clubs are about driving our cars. In order to retain members the club must give the members an opportunity to drive their vehicles. Every club says: "We should do more drives and rallies". Be the person in the club to make it happen. It is easy to be passive member waitig for someone else to do it but why not start with organizing a single event and go from there. If you plan it, they will most likely come. Remember that our cars were designed and built to be driven and that is why we are in the hobby!

Collaborate with Regional & **National Associations**

When it comes to The Collector Vehicle Hobby, there is no room for protectionism. Find the clubs and associations that share your passion and build a mutually beneficial relationship. Organizations like the Specialty Vehicle Association of Alberta and the National Association of Automobile Clubs of Canada are great places to start and are in place to support your club and the Collector Vehicle hobby at large.

Let's make the driving the purpose and goal of our clubs. Active clubs attract new members with new ideas.





Story and Photos by Bill MacKenzie Jr. Following each long winter, when shows and events start approaching, one of the first (and incidentally one of the largest) for the 'tuner' community is Driven Calgary. Held at the Olympic Oval on the University grounds, Driven brings together a large number of vehicles with the emphasis being on the aftermarket, so under one roof you'll find a range of vehicles - compacts, trucks, exotics, classics, and even bikes - with the common bond being the owners' desire to customize and personalize, be it via a few select alterations to a platform or rebuilds so extensive that only parts of the shell remain from the starting point.

Winter serves as a great time of course to get to work on project vehicles, so Driven is usually where a number of reworked or even brand new builds will officially be unveiled to the public before attending more shows over the rest of the season. As it happens, Calgary's edition of the show is also the first of the year as Driven then carries on to a few other locations around Canada, so alongside local cars you'll also find some brought in from other provinces or even further to be unveiled alongside local builds.

This year the show fell on May 6th, and as always demonstrated the ever-rising bar in terms of quality of not just the projects on display, but the show itself. Like the competitors and exhibitors, each year the event comes back better and stronger and this year's was no exception thanks to the hard work of the team running it all.

Leading up to the big day it had been announced that the organizers had arranged for some SEMA vehicles to attend this year, to bring in cars that hadn't been seen in person by our community before and showcase some truly wild builds. Another highlight was the inclusion of an incredibly rare Nismo 400R; a heavily-reworked version of the Nissan Skyline GT-R by Nissan Motorsports International (Nismo) of which only 44 were ever produced. Just prior to the show, chassis

number 29 was imported into Canada by a local enthusiast and understandably all day long at Driven was getting a lot of attention from spectators and exhibitors alike.

Looking around the rest of the Oval, the majority of vehicles on display were the 'hotrods' of the new generation; Honda Civics, Subaru BRZs, BMW M3s, Nissan 350Zs, and so on; and within that group as always was a large number of right-hand drive (RHD) vehicles, which are a common sight on our roads thanks to Canada's favourable vehicle import laws - Nissan Silvias and Sky-

lines, Toyota Supras, Mazda RX-7s, and

more could all be found around the event. Despite the differences in year, make, or country of origin though, all were alike in that they showcased their respective owner's vision and interpretation of the platform. Engine swaps, elaborate body kits, interior retrims, custom paint, rare parts; every one had its own nuances and custom touches to set it apart from the rest.

That said, not every vehicle at Driven was extensively modified, or even modified at all. As some of the commonly-modified platforms are now reaching or even surpassing the 25year mark, we're seeing some owners refrain from heavy modification in favour of a more restoration and preservation-focused approach. Case in point, my mother had on display at the

The love of two iconic brands in automotive history has created a friendship between AMAC and the Calgary Thunderbird club, and by each supporting the other's annual show and shines, an impressive selection of automotive history is highlighted and enjoyed by enthusiasts of the Ford brand.

o you want a hobby car. There are several categories to choose from...classics, hot rods, muscle car, restored, sports car, street rod, rat rod, antique...lots to choose from but what it comes down to is what interests you the most.

I built my own, a 1927 Model 'T'Tudor. Yes, you end up with something you created yourself but it's generally cheaper and faster to buy one already built.

So you search e-bay, Kijiji, Craig's list, car magazines, newspapers, Hemmings magazine, and you find the one you want.

Buying a vehicle from a private seller can come with great risk. The seller has no professional reputation to protect and one of the things they can skip out on is safety. It's an important issue these days, one you want to get right.

First of all....NEVER BUY A VEHICLE UNSEEN.

A friend of mine decided to buy a street rod and went to the internet to search. He found what he wanted in the eastern States and purchased the car based on pictures and phone conversations with the seller.

He flew to New York and completed the deal. The car looked great, just like the pictures.

He drove it back to Calgary and of course had an out-ofprovince done on it. He wanted a few minor changes done so he asked a mechanic friend to perform the modifications.

The mechanic put it up on a hoist and was aghast at what he found.

- 1 The rear suspension was held up with two grade 5-3/8in. bolts....no lock washers and the coil-overs weren't installed perpendicular to the bracket [Pic 1].
- The inner frame rail was cracked and coming apart behind the steering box [Pic 2].
- 3 The rear transmission mount was sitting on a piece of rubber hose with no bolts holding it down [Pic 3].
- The motor was hard-mounted to the frame with 3/8 in. Gr.5 Bolts (The mechanic stated that the car looked like it was originally built as a drag racer) [Pic 4].
- There was a fuel leak dripping onto the exhaust pipe in the rear.
- The steel brake-lines were not secured and were rubbing against the frame.
- 7 There was no parking brake installed.

The mechanic that made the repairs said, 'He wouldn't have passed this car to cross the street let alone the country'.

The repairs were made and the owner stated that it feels like a whole new car, it drives and handles beautifully.

Remember...he drove this back to Calgary from New York. The new owner is very lucky none of the issues caused an accident on the way home.

Whether it's across town or the other side of the country, the best advice is to take along a trusted mechanic to have a look at the vehicle before any money exchanges hands. This could save you a lot of trouble (and money on repairs).

Our sanctioned events and meetings have General Liability coverage ranging from bodily injury and property damage to volunteer medical payments. It also includes setup and takedown at club events, all club meetings and events such as swap meets and fundraisers. Further, the insurance company acts on our behalf and our member clubs when there is an incident. All volunteers and committees are covered. Our current limit is \$5,000,000.

If you are an Officer or Director of your club, you will want coverage. It is your responsibility in your role to act in a reasonable and prudent manner. That being said, in the litigious culture of today, directors and officers are being named in lawsuits even when they are not apparently involved. The SVAA insurance program covers the cost of your legal defence. Our current limit is \$1,000,000.00.

What does the SVAA insurance program cost us?

Using a club with 20 members as an example, the cost of insurance is \$110 per year. A Certificate of Insurance is sent to the club upon receipt of their application for membership. Additional Certificates covering specific events are provided as needed at no additional charge.

Insurance is available only to SVAA member clubs.

Chugging slowly by me as I walked along, a steam-powered tractor circled the grounds, showcasing farming practices from an era not so long ago. Next was a visit to the blacksmith's shop where I was proudly shown a frying pan that had been made earlier in the day, and a friendly group relaxing in the shade had some stories to share over at the truck museum. This large building featured a colourful display of oilcans perched high on a shelf that overlooked a sizeable arrangement of trucks from all eras that were used on farms, oil fields, and in construction.

By a happy coincidence, a few members of my antique car club were also enjoying an outing thus providing an opportunity for a few snapshots, so I set up a colourful photo op in front of the replica Esso station.

Picnic tables on site allow for a nice afternoon's outing, so bring a lunch and enjoy the 50-acre site at your leisure.

n one of the warmest days to date this year, and the warmest show date in years, the Vintage Sports Car Club of Calgary held its annual show Saturday, July 22, in Stanley Park. With the Alberta Adolescent Recovery Centre as its designated charity, Fred Phillips, who has contributed

greatly to the charity's efforts via tours of his collection and raffled rides in some of his cars among other endeavours, brought along a car marked to be sold for the benefit of AARC. Additional contributions will assist the Centre.

With Ferrari the featured marque in celebration of its 70th Anniversary, some 38, mostly red, examples of the Italian make turned up, with models dating from the 60s to the

present, including a few cars not previously shown and some models that get driven more than shown. Rare (or rarer, relatively) models present included F40, F50, 330GTC, 275GTB/4 and 458 Speciale. Glenn Yuen arranged the fine show by number of cylinders and year so that viewers could get a sense of the development history of Ferrari.

But there were other Italian makes represented, including Alfa Romeos old and new, a Maserati spyder, a newly-restored Lamborghini Islero S coupe – one of the scarcer models, small Fiats, and two surprising Lancia models: a Fulvia Sport and a Touring-bodied Flaminia coupe, both recent additions to the Calgary collector car scene. In addition spectators were treated to the loud sound of a race-prepped Lamborgh-

ini Diablo coupe as it slid out in the mid-afternoon. And not one but two Panteras were there, in not quite the same shade of yellow.

German cars were extremely well represented this year with big BMW and Porsche turnouts, with club support. Both makes featured a wide range of their models (new and old), with the Porsche group also splif into both air- and water-cooled groups. BMW sedans complemented the

roadsters and a few Porsche 356 (older model, for you newbies) gave a good idea of how the make started out. For range of models, it was hard to beat Mercedes-Benz, with a Unimog and a van accompanying sedan and convertible models. Audis present included sedans and an R8 coupe. A treat was seeing both a coupe and a convertible Karmann-Ghia together, both nicely restored in bright colours.

















Because many of the VSCCC members own British sports cars a good showing of British (and related) cars (and related vehicles) is expected. And they delivered, with everything from workhorse and special touring Land Rovers through Minis (original type) to the more regularly seen Triumphs

and MGs. But that wasn't all. Pre-war Austins (running and under work), a Rolls-Royce Silver Cloud, a Daimler SP250 (fiberglass body), and a nice range of Jaguars, including sedans, convertibles and E-type coupes were all presented. Oh, and a Jensen-Healey to accompany the Austin-Healeys. A couple of late (new) generation MGs made an interesting contrast to the TD



Volvo, Citroen, Saab, DeLorean and Opel models were among the other European makes seen and I've probably left some out; the range (and number – 197) of cars exceeded that of any recent year. Most owners were near their charges and were willing to answer questions and tell stories about the vehicles and the adventures involved in acquiring and owning them, most even being true. Spectators arrived steadily all day long and most cars stayed until 4pm, the official closing time. There were food trucks, making it possible to eat on site and a supplier of ice cream, much appreciated on a hot day. A word of thanks goes out to the various sponsor organizations and vendors, many of whom set up on site and were available to both exhibitors and the public.

Now, finally, a word about the Volks Folks. A large (huge) contingent of VW fans and owners set up in an area adjacent to the main field (or maybe they are the main field) and while I didn't get there, it is pretty clear that, as in the past, they

have a terrific time. A completely amazing variety of vehicles show up, the owners are enthusiastic and outgoing and they play music and basically party all day. This hobby is supposed to be fun and they honour that. Of course, the most serious the non-VW group gets is competing for the people's choice

awards in the various classes (based this year on make): some people really get their cars sparkling in and out while others just hose the bugs off and hop on down to the show. (Not really; this year the cars were all in pretty outstanding condition.)

A lot of time and effort goes into a show like this; thanks and congratulations to the organizers. The result was well worthwhile and something to be proud of.
