hat a summer for car events? No rain, almost no hail, and many nice warm evenings to get our cars out for the ice cream runs. I had the opportunity to talk with many of you over the summer and to thank you for your support of the SVAA and of the hobby in general.

We have to stay diligent and stay current on any issues that may affect the hobby. A couple of safety related concerns did come up this summer. The first and most common concern was regarding stunting during or on leaving car shows. Just recently another car lost control on acceleration while leaving a Cars & Coffee event in Boise, Idaho and injured 11 people including several children. We all like our horsepower but we must resist the urge to let it run loose where bystanders are present. The other was on the disregard of the vehicle equipment regulations for our vehicles. Whether it was that rock that came off an open wheel vehicle and chipped a windshield, the rod without windshield wipers that rear ended a buddy while trying to get home in that sudden down pour, or the new after market headlights on that new pickup that could serve as aircraft landing lights. These are all incidents that put a negative spin on our hobby.

The collector car hobby currently has a good rapport with our local police forces but it only takes one incident to sour the relationship. We try to be a self regulating hobby as much as possible, so please take a moment to ask that friend not to race out of the cruise nights or to ensure that the you have recently reviewed Alberta's Vehicle Equipment Regulations and that your vehicle is in compliance and that you have done a basic safety check before you leave your shop.

I just attended the annual meeting of the NAACC directors and both these issues came up for discussion as they are concerns in other provinces. In some cases enforcements are taking place and currently in Ontario a mechanic was been charged with fraud for issuing inspection certificates for vehicles that were not compliant with the vehicle equipment regulations.

Enough of my rant for this issue. Enjoy what little driving weather we have left as it feels like we may have missed fall and went right into winter. So now is the time to start thinking about preparing our vehicles for the winter storage and maybe even checking out the SVAA website.

SELLERS STILL BEAR A LEGAL RESPONSIBILITY IN CAR SALES

Re: "Buyer Beware," Fall 2017.

The article "Buyer Beware" page 30, in the Fall edition of "Alberta' Rides" caught my eye. It's a good article, one needing repeating often to keep old car buyers sharp when investing in the hobby. However a point made in this piece which states"The seller has no professional reputation to protect and one of the things they can "skip out on is safety" needs clarification as the message is incomplete. Let me explain. Governments at the Provincial and Federal level in Canada have gone to great lengths to protect consumers from a variety of frauds, misrepresentations, obfuscations and so on prevalent in industries preying on consumers. In the world of the automobile it is very tough for a licensed dealer to sell a faulty vehicle, or fail to "clean" more than the windows. He must deliver, a safe, lien free, encumbrance free, fully disclosed vehicle, or he will not be in business long. So what about buying private then - are you protected? The answer is probably NO as in the case highlighted in "Buyer Beware", where you purchase a vehicle off the internet and end up in trouble as mentioned in the article. BUT, yes throughout Canada, as there are very specific laws safeguarding consumers from fraud, of all kinds. If scoundrels rip people off and never answer for their crime, it has much more to do with a failure on the part of the consumer to pursue the matter, activating a legal system providing specific legal rights, protecting him/her, than there is a lack of rules doing the protecting. Skipping out on the safety aspect of a collectible car, a rod, a custom job, or the family car, is a dangerous slope for a seller to travel in Canada. Sellers, licensed or non-licensed, (doesn't matter) are bound by law to deliver to the buyer, a safe vehicle, or state fully and completely what repairs are needed. Don't test this in the courts – you'll likely lose. Once a vehicle has been registered in your name, you are part of that vehicles history, and it's your legal responsibility whether you are a "professional seller" or one a one-time seller representing Granma's estate selling and her prized vintage Oldsmobile. It becomes your responsibility to ensure the vehicle is safe for the road, that any suspected, or predictable issues or faults are fully disclosed and discussed with the buyer - before a deal is struck. Surprised? You shouldn't be in 2017. A bill of sale even when stating "sold as is where is, no warranty implied or given" or words such as, offer the seller little protection in the courts and the ensuing legal ramifications, unless it is stated clearly and understood by both parties that the vehicle is being sold "as a parts vehicle only". Ninety-nine percent of all transactions hum along beautifully, until an accident occurs where personal injury (or worse) occurs, and lip licking lawyers become involved. There's no shortage in case law where life takes some bad turns in car sales gone sideways - as I said don't test it!

Good advice for both sides is this. Sellers whether selling the family Camry or your '29 highboy, have it inspected by an accredited automotive faculty, then repair/faults and any other issues safety related found before passing the vehicle along to the next owner. Keep a copy of the document generated during this process in a safety deposit box. Doing so could be the best money you'll ever spend - and bonus - you'll sell your vehicle quicker with peace of mind in this law suit happy world we live in today. Nothing else protects you, no words, nothing protects you from a court telling you what you had an obligation to know beforehand – that you were morally and legally obliged to the buyer to deliver a vehicle - safe for use on public roadways which did not pose risk to life or limb. Selling, and clearly stating "for parts only" changes everything. As for buyers, ensure the seller has done his due diligence, and be prepared to walk the other way if he hasn't or won't anything less is asking for grief down the road.

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

Brandon Thomas was killed at just 17 years of age when his car was struck by a drunk driver. As a memorial to him, and as a way to spread the message to never drink and drive, Show Your Ride was started as an annual event by his mother Kim, with 2017's being the fourth edition.

Held at the University of Calgary, a reported 720 vehicles took part making it a truly massive show, with anything but a consistent theme to the vehicles present. New or old, restored or modified or untouched, domestic or imported, immaculate or still a work in progress; this brought together vehicles and enthusiasts from all areas of the automotive world and illustrated just how diverse it is. The common bond was not a specific manufacturer or type, but rather

the love of cars and the desire to support such a worthwhile event.

There were assorted prizes to be won, goodie bags for all of the participants, and a mobile dyno on hand for anyone who wished to have their vehicle's power measured – which proved to once again be a popular attraction. Food trucks kept participants nourished and commemorative photos were also available.

At the end of the event, once names had been called for the prizes as well as a few awards, hundreds of blue balloons were then handed out before all being released into the sky on cue, in memory of Brandon. Everyone stopped to watch the mass of balloons fly up and away, and remember why they had all gathered that day; Show Your Ride is an event that brings the community together and is a great legacy for Brandon, and it's wonderful to see the continued support for an event with so much meaning and importance behind it.

hether going to meets and shows, doing routine maintenance, or planning modifications, each follows their passion on their own. Knowledgeable, confident, and independent, these four women are forging

their path in what is typically a man's hobby. Their reasons for their interest in the automotive scene are as varied as their ages, from 22 to 61, but they share a common bond – the pride in their very special vehicles.



KATELYN GALLUP

Katelyn is a 22-year-old woman who has a slightly peculiar car. Baby Girl, as she calls it, is a 1986 Plymouth Caravelle that had once belonged to her aunt and grandmother, who was affectionately known as Nana. This car holds a special place in her heart. Katelyn explains.

"While I never got to meet my aunt, Nana was a huge part of my life while growing up. When she no longer wished to drive, she gave me the keys to her car and I've taken care of it ever since. It's a memorial car – I carry the memories of my Nana with me every time I drive it."

Her love of cars started at the age of 15 as a fan of the TV show "Supernatural", which featured the 1967 Chevy Impala, and she also regularly attended the World of Wheels with her dad as a special time to share.

The Caravelle became her auto body project in high school, and once it was running, she started attending A&W classic

car meets and other local weekend shows. Baby Girl was her first car and was driven daily for three years, but now it's used only for shows.

Katelyn does small repairs herself, and has assisted putting in the engine. Regular maintenance keeps Baby Girl running, but like any classic, it has its issues along the way. New sub-woofers hidden in the trunk often announce the arrival of her car long before it's in sight. Katelyn laughs when she explains, "It's our sense of humour."

Katelyn recently joined the Airdrie Time Travellers car club, and at a show this summer was awarded second place for "Young Gun" – an award for someone who shows their vehicle and is under the age of 25.

The new friends met along the way have become Katelyn's car family, a sentiment shared by many car enthusiasts in this community.



YOLANDA SAMPSON

The lights in the Olympic Oval reflect softly off the matte white dipped paint of Yolanda's 2013 Ford Focus ST. While other cars have reflections from the overhead spotlights, the Focus has an almost ethereal glow to it.

Yolanda has been interested in cars since around age 6 when she had a love for motorbikes and remembers her lack of enthusiasm for her family's boxy Volvos while growing up.

"My true passion and love for cars didn't really fully become a reality for me until I moved to Alberta from Nova Scotia in 1997 when I was 18, but I didn't buy my first car, a base model 2003 Toyota Corolla until I was 24. It hauled canoes, kayaks and did so many road trips.

"Fast forward 10 years and it was finally time for me to look at a new car, one that I could modify. I had done so much reading and research on after market parts and had decided I wanted a Mazda 3 First Gen."

Yolanda enjoyed the car for several years, but "Boost Envy" and passion for a turbo charged car led her to purchase a 2013 Ford Focus ST from the owner of the shop that had done many upgrades and modification to her Mazda.

"I knew that the modifications already done to the ST would be the same I would do if I had purchased the car stock. It was a perfect base for me to start adding my own

touches to the car." Current modifications include coilovers, Cobb tuning, light bar, blow off valve, spoiler, liquid wrapped exterior finish, window tint, and race wheels, but more mods are in the car's future.

Yolanda travels to the shows alone, but her husband and happy dog Penny often drop by to say hi.

"My loving husband supports me 100% in my car addiction and he helps with installation of new parts and comes to the shows to support me, but he's just not into spending hours detailing, doing modifications and standing around parking lots looking at cars."

Why a tuner car as opposed to a classic? "Good question, I've never really thought about it. I enjoy all types of cars but yes, my passion is tuners/imports."

"I think it's mostly the ability to make it my own and create something that is unique to me. It's the attention and the "Breaking Necks" factor that really draws me to the tuner scene. There is such a huge after market out there for these types of cars and some pretty crazy stuff. I could go on about wide body kits, stance, camber, wraps, dips, wheels but the possibilities are endless for these cars. It amazes me to see some of the builds that people are doing."

Owned by Jess since 2011, the truck has become a father/daughter project since her dad Rob, also known as "Sparky" in the local car scene, became interested in the car hobby around the same time.

While Jess was on an overseas holiday, Rob was scouring the ads on Kijiji and found the truck and watched as the ad appeared and disappeared several times, so he made the move to buy it before it disappeared for good. It was an incomplete project since the owner had run out of money and had to sell it.

"The owner asked me if I would love and take care of it, and when I said yes, he sold it to me for a very reasonable price."

It didn't even have a gas tank at the time, so a jerry can was improvised to provide fuel on the way home. The truck became a project for Jess and Rob, along with a group of friends, and restoration started with gutting and redoing the interior, a new exhaust system and the all-important gas tank.

The Studebaker has now been completely restored and Jess has become a member of the Studebaker club of Calgary and the International Club. A fun part of owning the truck is her regular 'face time' chats with an 80+year old fellow enthusiast who offers help and advice when needed from down in Phoenix, Arizona.

The car hobby is still a big part of Jess's life and every Wednesday her and her dad go out for dinner and a car meet in the summer or work on some new project in the winter. It's a special time that is sacred for both of them and is upheld no matter what the week brings.

The Vintage Burgundy 1967 Thunderbird was the first car Sue ever drove when her dad bought it back in 1977. Although she has owned the TBird since inheriting it back in 2010, her interest in the car scene didn't develop until the unexpected passing of her husband a few short years later.

"My husband passed away in March 2013 and as the summer approached I found I was becoming somewhat of a recluse. I hadn't driven in almost a decade due to a bad accident many years earlier, so I was housebound without my Bill."

"My son Bill Jr. had an active interest in the tuner car scene, so to get me out of the house he started taking me to the weekly car meets at Chinook centre. While I felt out of place initially among the young crowd, I soon got to know them

and started to understand and appreciate their passion and how their cars became a form of individual expression."

With the help of patient friends, Sue slowly started driving again and now enjoys driving her TBird and Nissan 240SX convertible to shows near and far. While these cars remain totally stock, her 2012 Ford Focus has been modified with the addition of a carbon fiber lip, rear spoiler, Rays wheels, contrasting vinyl accents, and more mods are on the horizon.

"I owe my friends so much for their gift of time and I also appreciate the car family I have come to know these past few years. Working on and showing my cars has become my salvation and an escape to new places and adventures."

Whether navigating rush hour traffic or cruising to a small town, the sentiment is the same.

"I don't have to drive, I get to drive. Every trip is a gift."

ntroduced to North America for the 1997 model year, the Acura Integra Type R (ITR) was the first Type R model that Honda ever sold in the market, and was also the last until the recent arrival of the 2017 Civic Type R. Regarded as one of the best-handling FWD platforms ever built, the ITR was far more than a case of just new badging and cosmetic changes; as compared to a standard Integra, a Type R was differentiated by quite a lengthy list of updates. Mechanically, an ITR was made unique by a different engine and transmission, revised suspension and brakes, and 5-lug hubs instead of 4-lug. Weight was reduced by the removal of sound deadening, a unique thinner windshield, no cruise control, and the removal of the sunroof and bodyside moldings. On top of this the shell itself was also reinforced as compared to regular models, while a unique front lip and rear wing were fitted for improved aerodynamics.

For Honda enthusiasts the Type R was always a revered model and no time was wasted in picking them up and enjoying them; from track monsters to show winners or something in between, Type Rs were almost immediately being modified and used for various different purposes. Being such a capable platform out of the box made them that much better of a starting point for modifications. However, due to their desirability they also quickly became a target for thieves for their rare and valuable components. Over the years, others naturally were also crashed, either through regular use on the streets or from pushing just a bit too hard on the track.

Now 20 years on from the North American introduction of the model, finding an untouched, left-hand drive ITR is not the easiest task in the world. A little under 4000 ITRs in total were sold here during the four model years that they were offered (1997, 1998, 2000, 2001), and when the stolen, crashed, and modified examples are subtracted from that number, it's no wonder why original models are now commanding such high prices.



As they were individually numbered cars, often ITRs will be referred to by their model year and serial number; as such, the one you see here is known as 00-0177 – chassis number 177 produced for the 2000 model year. Alex had been keeping his eye on it for a while in wait of the day when the opportunity to purchase it would arise. A few years ago that day finally came, so he wasted no time in picking it up and bringing it home, to get started on his plans for it.

00-0177 was an original Calgary car and had remained almost entirely stock, but as the icing on the cake it was completely numbers-matching. It was also in fairly good condition for its age but that didn't stop Alex from tearing it down to a shell in preparation for a full restoration.

The first step was to refresh the shell; as it was in good shape Alex opted to keep the engine bay's original paint but the rest of the car was given a fresh coat of the original Phoenix Yellow hue. After it had cured the entire exterior was then covered in paint protection film to keep it safe.

With that handled the next step was to reassemble the car of course, but instead of reinstalling all of the parts that had come off of it, Alex had a different idea. Everything that had to be retained to allow the car to stay numbers matching was, but beyond that nearly everything else was replaced with brand new OEM components. The wheels, the intake arm, the paper door speakers, the lights; thanks to countless hours of searching, inside and out 00-0177 received one new part after another and slowly but surely started to look like a brand new car again.

With the final components installed and the car tuned, the ITR finally returned to the streets of Calgary in the summer of 2017. It has been receiving plenty of attention and already took home an award from one local car show, where it was up against some stiff competition. Most importantly though, Alex has been having a huge amount of fun behind the wheel, enjoying what is almost a brand-new ITR now.

So with this project completed, what is next for Alex then? Well, to go alongside 00-0177 he has actually purchased a second ITR, this time a Championship White model (01-1263). As it didn't quite make it through the years as untouched as this yellow example however, he's planning to take more of a restomod approach to it as opposed to keeping it entirely factory-spec - and that should make for quite a pair; one ITR preserved as Honda built it, and one updated and personalized with newer components. Stock or modified, the Integra Type R continues to be a great platform and Alex will be able to freely enjoy both Honda's, and his, versions of it.
