PROPOSED ENVIRONMENTAL CODE OF BEHAVIOR FOR THE SVAA

our Board is recommending the adoption of an Environmental Code. What is presented below is based on the FIVA code adopted in Europe some years ago. It is timely for us to demonstrate environmental awareness and concern as our society is adopting an aggressive environmental stance. What is being proposed for a vote at our Annual General Meeting in May is that we adopt the following. We expect considerable discussion and suggestions for revision. Please discuss at your club meetings sharing any concerns you may have with your SVAA Representative

Proposed SVAA Environmental Code

The SVAA member clubs encourage their members to be aware of the following in the pursuit of the hobby.

- 1 We display respect for the environment in everything we do.
- 2 We keep our vehicles in good condition with correctly set ignition and correctly adjusted fuel systems.

- 3 We avoid unnecessary engine idling and noisy behavior.
- We avoid any oil spills from our vehicles. Leakages are repaired with modern materials. We never leave a pool of oil where our vehicle has been standing. We remove any oil spills using appropriate materials or use an absorbent "drip mat" when parking.
- 5 Used engine oil, gasoline and other environmental hazardous fluids are disposed of through our local recycling centre.
- 6 We take old lead batteries, worn and scrap parts to the recycling centre.
- 7 When carrying out engine overhauls, we consider installing hardened valve seats to allow the use of "green fuel".
- 8 We choose replacement materials and spare parts that take the environment into consideration.
- 9 We store unrestored vehicles and parts in an environmentally responsible manner.
- 10 Whenever possible, we use biodegradable automotive products.

e work hard for our money, and we're pleased to be able to share our earnings with local charities" said in-coming President Jeff Langford, of the River City Classics Car Club.

On a very cold wintery night 18 representatives of High River charities were invited to meet at the Call of the West Museum, where the car club regularly meets. The occasion was the annual presentation of money earned at Alberta's biggest car show, the River City Classics Car Club's annual Show and Shine in late September.

Ted Dawson, treasurer, reminded everyone that "The money raised in the community, stays in the community. About \$10,000.00 goes back into High River every year."

The registration fee for the Show and Shine was raised by \$5.00 this year with \$2.00 going to the Salvation Army for their food bank and \$2.00 designated for the Eamons Garage restoration project. RCCCC also keeps a big enough bank account to cover start-up costs of next year's show.

In previous years, RCCCC collected non-perishable goods for the food bank, but it was a giant hassle. After talking with the Salvation Army, we discovered they actually preferred cash, and they could make cash go a lot farther because of their bargaining powers. So cash it was.

The recipients include the two local museums, Call of the West and Highwood. The Highwood also gets a "special" donation of a big bulk buy of toilet paper before the September show. They kindly let us use their washroom facilities during the show for volunteers and patrons. Occasionally, it's also been a welcome place to get warm at 6AM, before the sun is up.

The High River Rotary Club matches the funds they receive for use in the community. The Lion's club works the show with us and then contributes to the Little Britches and Santa Claus parades and "Light Up George Lane Park". Minor Hockey helps families with their registration. Three elementary schools have breakfast and lunch programmes. The Handi Bus is taking ownership of a much-needed larger bus.

"Domestic violence unfortunately isn't going away", said the representative from Rowan House, a women's shelter. And the Narrow Road Home representative agreed. At the beautiful Foothills Hospice patients and their families don't pay for their stay. The High River Hospital Foundation is putting their donation toward upgrading the maternity unit, helping to attract more young families to High River. The Fetal Alcohol Society supports a huge "donut" area around Calgary and all the way down to the border. The Children's Wish Foundation has made several local kids and their families very happy.

And near and dear to the heart of RCCCC members is the Eamons Garage restoration project where "big" progress has been made in the last year. Russ Shaw and his crew were recognized for the volunteer labour hours they've put in. Also recognized were the Highwood High School students who had fun manning the barricades from 6AM till noon.

A delightful surprise happened when Bryce Walsh from the insurance firm of Haggarty turned the table on the River City Classics Car Club and presented a cheque for \$5,000.00 to go toward the Eamons Garage project! "Thank-you" Bryce and Haggarty for an unexpected, but very welcome, donation. It will be put to good use!

Both Past President Brian Chipchase and Show and Shine chairman, Al Leonhardt were recognized and thanked for their many hours that contributed to the success of our 2017 show.

RCCCC boasts a membership of about 70 members on any given year and every one of them, plus family and friends, are recruited to run the show. In 2017 we registered 1103 cars and could have registered more...and will do so next year. It's a great day for car nuts and their friends.

PREPARED FOR THE UNEXPECTED ?

sunny day, around noon, busy restaurant parking lot – a safe place to be, right? Should be.

In all my years of city living this has never happened before. I was a victim of an attempted carjacking / robbery.

I took my Suburban out in early November to give it a wash, but stopped first to get a quick snack at a fast-food place near Canada Olympic Park. I scouted for a spot with space enough to swing the truck around and back in, away from other cars since I like more room to navigate my big rig. Upon reflection I'm so glad I took those extra few moments.

Once inside I chose a spot near the door and glanced around at the crowd in between bites. A construction worker across the room was paying more attention to me than I found comfortable. Whenever I would glance up I could see he was watching me, which made me uneasy,

however there were enough people around that I wasn't unduly alarmed, but my guard was up. Finally he and his co-worker left so I relaxed and finished my lunch.

As I walked across the big parking lot to my truck, I surveyed the area but couldn't see him, so I thought I was done with that whole business. I settled into the driver's seat, put my purse beside me and dug around for my keys. Just as I put them in the ignition, I noticed a newer model silver Mercedes approaching rather quickly from the left. I glanced at the driver, a rather disheveled individual, and the contrast of driver to vehicle made me watch as he approached. He parked right beside me even though there were other empty spaces, and as he pulled straight into the spot, our driver's doors were together. I looked him in the eye and muttered under my breath that he had better not make a door ding.

He squeezed out, then started to walk around the front of my truck, so close that he was brushing the bumper. As he started to turn towards my passenger door, instinct took over and I hit the lock button just as he reached for the handle. He seemed surprised to hear the click of the lock and motioned for me to open the door, but I shook my head and started the engine.

I could see out of the corner of my eye that he was still gesturing but I wouldn't look at him, focusing instead on the car in front of me that was blocking my way while it slowly made its way through the lot. I started to panic as he began tugging on the handle, trying to get in. I should have used the horn to draw attention to my situation or at least attempt to deafen him, but it didn't even occur to me in my frazzled state. In what seemed like an eternity but was probably less than thirty seconds, I finally pulled ahead

slowly to avoid the other cars and as I looked in my rearview mirror, much to my dismay, he was following me on foot.

Once I got to the main road I took off, shaking so hard that I missed my turnoff and had to go out of my way to loop around. I pulled over into the

first parking lot that was a safe distance away and grabbed my phone to make a note of all the details before I forgot them. I then texted a friend to let him know what happened, and remained in the lot until I was calm enough to drive again.

I've always tried to be safe when out and around as I frequently drive alone, but nothing prepared me for this. Was this guy working in tandem with the construction worker? I was certainly targeted so my instincts tell me yes.

What did I learn? Things like this can happen anywhere, so taking a few precautions ahead of time can help should I find myself in a similar situation.

Locking the doors the second I get in my vehicle has become my number one habit. Often when I get in I fiddle with my phone or dig for sunglasses, etc., but now I hit the lock button, quickly get what I need, then put my purse on the floor out of sight.

Backing into the spot took a bit of extra time, but I'm so glad I did, since in my agitated state I probably would have backed into somebody. It was so much easier to

drive straight ahead and get away.

Pay more notice to unusual behavior. I should have written a description of the construction worker down while I was having my lunch.

Be more aware of my surroundings in a parking lot. Is anyone standing near my vehicle or watching me as I walk towards it?

I consulted with the officer handing my case as to the legalities and I now have a dog/coyote spray in the cup holder, one in my purse, and one in my pocket. I also have a scream alarm hooked to my purse that delivers a deafening 130db siren when yanked on.

Should we be afraid or paranoid every time we go out? No, but vigilance is important. As my friend reassured me, chances of this happening again are slim to none, and he's right, as Calgary is a fairly safe city for its size, but complacency is not a good idea when it comes to personal safety.



his is a riveting read! If you have concerns over the liability of club members to obligations incurred by your organization, this is a must read.

The intent is to introduce you to the Alberta Societies Act describing what becoming a society entails and the benefits of so doing."The Alberta Societies act requires that we do this..."; "The Alberta Societies Act says we cannot..."; The Alberta Societies Act talks about our club funds"; "The Alberta Societies Act says we must have this list of officers". And on it goes. I was beginning to feel frustrated enough about the rumors surrounding the Act that I wanted to read it. Dave Scragg of the Alberta Iron Indians Pontiac Club (Edmonton) must have read my mind sending me a copy of the act, the regulations the workbook for the Protection of Privacy of Personal Information Act. What follows is a summary of the three documents intended to clarify the muddification I know I was experiencing and expect others are too. If you would like to read the act, it is available at http://www.qp.alberta.ca/ documents/Acts/S14.pdf. Here we go...

Incorporation

The Act provides guidelines on who may incorporate. The reasons for incorporation are well described in the Act.

3(1)

Five or more persons may become incorporated under this Act for any benevolent, philanthropic, charitable, provident, scientific, artistic, literary, social, educational, agricultural, sporting or other useful purpose, but not for the purpose of carrying on a trade or business.1

The application includes the purpose of the organization, its proposed bylaws, and the proposed corporate name. An important part of the application for incorporation as a Society under the Act is the choice of a name. The goal of the Act is to ensure that the name be unique in Canada and use only words that are not disallowed by the Registrar.

All of this appears to be a lot of work. It is not. The Act clearly describes what is needed for each. There are forms provided to complete the application. The minimum requirements are not intended to be onerous nor are they.

Here is a quote from the Act describing what is to be included in the bylaws.

The bylaws that accompany the application shall contain provisions for all the following matters:

- (a) terms of admission of members and their rights and obligations;
- (b) the conditions of withdrawal of members and the manner, if any, in which a member may be expelled;
- (c) the mode and time of calling general and special meetings of the society and number constituting a quorum at any of those meetings and rights of voting;
- (d) the appointment and removal of directors and officers and their duties, powers and remuneration;
- (e) the exercise of borrowing powers;
- (f) the audit of accounts;
- (g) the custody and use of the seal of the society;
- (h) the manner of making, altering and rescinding bylaws;
- (i) the preparation and custody of minutes of proceedings of meetings of the society and of the directors, and other books and records of the society;
- (j) the time and place, if any, at which the books and records of the society may be inspected by members.²

Additional bylaws can be prepared and passed. They are part of the bylaws of the organization and must be included. Upon successful completion of the process, the Registrar issues certificate of incorporation. Until this certificate is received, the organization is not incorporated. Once received, the organization is now a corporation in the province of Alberta.

As a Society under the Act,

17(1) A society may acquire and take by purchase, donation, devise or otherwise all kinds of real estate and personal property, and may sell, exchange,

mortgage, lease, let, improve and develop it, and may erect and maintain any necessary buildings.

17(2) The funds and property of the society shall be used and dealt with for its legitimate objects only and in accordance with its bylaws.³

The Society has a wide range of operations limited essentially by it "legitimate object". Not unreasonable nor particularly limiting to operations.

An important section of the Act addresses member liability. Once incorporated under the act,

21 No member of a society is, in the member's individual capacity, liable for a debt or liability of the society.⁴


This, if no other reason exists, is sufficient for each of our clubs to want to become a Society under the Act. This statement protects our members.

Ongoing Requirements

The Act requires that the Society hold an Annual General Meeting in the same month as the issuance of the certificate of incorporation. Audited financial statements have to be presented and approved. Then a submission to the Registrar is made including:

- (a) The address of the registered office of the society,
- (b) the full name, address and occupation of each officer and director of the society,
- (c) any information respecting the members of the society that may be required by regulations under the Agricultural and Recreational Land Ownership Act and section 35 of the Citizenship Act (Canada) in the form and manner prescribed by those regulations, and
- (d) the audited financial statement presented at the last annual general meeting of the society.





Again, not an onerous requirement. Note: the financial statements do not need to be audited by a professional accountant unless so specified in the organization bylaws.

One final note on the Act: Section 36(1) addresses the membership register. Its requirements are worth reading, especially those on admission and departure dates.

- 36(1) A society shall keep a register of its members containing the names of the applicants for incorporation and the name of every other person who is admitted as a member of the society, together with the following particulars of each person:
- (a) the full name and residential address;
- (b) the date on which the person is admitted as a member;
- (c) the date on which the person ceases to be a member;
- (d) the class of membership of the person, if the society has classes of members.⁵

A partner to the Alberta Societies Act is the Alberta Regulation 122/ 2000 Societies Act Societies Regulation. It is available at http://www.qp.alberta.ca/documents/Regs/2000_122. pdf . It provides more detail than included in the act. For us, the more important parts of the regulations are the Schedules. They provide forms for application, notice of address and the annual return amongst others. This information and structure helps clubs new to the process to successfully incorporate then maintain that incorporation.

The Regulation lays out, in Schedule 2, the fees required for each part of the process; for example, incorporation costs \$50. Be sure to check the Regulation when you file for incorporation as the fees may change.

The intent of this article is to make you more aware of the Alberta Societies Act and the benefits to a club of incorporation under the act. If for no other reason, I would urge that clubs incorporate for the protection of its membership. If you have questions, I can be reached at ted@svaalberta.com. 
