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





SVAA INSURANCE PACKAGE SUMMARY Top Notch Protection at Low Cost

Why do we, as specialty vehicle club people, have insurance?

One word: PROTECTION. The SVAA has, for many years, worked with its broker to provide a comprehensive insurance program to clubs at reasonable cost.

What do we get?

Our sanctioned events and meetings have General Liability coverage ranging from bodily injury and property damage to volunteer medical payments. It also includes setup and takedown at club events, all club meetings and events such as swap meets and fundraisers.

Further, the insurance company acts on our behalf and our member clubs when there is an incident. All volunteers and committees are covered. Our current limit is \$5,000,000.

If you are an Officer or Director of your club, you will want coverage. It is your responsibility in your role to act in a reasonable and prudent manner. That being said, in the litigious culture of today, directors and officers are being named in lawsuits even when they are not apparently involved. The SVAA insurance program covers the cost of your legal defence. Our current limit is \$1,000,000.00.

What does the SVAA insurance program cost us?

Using a club with 20 members as an example, the cost of insurance is \$110 per year. A Certificate of Insurance is sent to the club upon receipt of their application for membership. Additional Certificates covering specific events are provided as needed at no additional charge.

Insurance is available only to SVAA member clubs.






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SUE MACKENZIE ON THE INJURED LIST

bout a year ago I read about the reduction of zinc dialkyl dithiophosphate (ZDDP) in the oils supplied with API approval that could affect sliding and high pressure (EP) friction in our cars. The reduction of these chemicals in supplied oils was based on the fact that phosphates reduce the effectiveness and eventually damage catalytic converters and introduce minute amounts of pollutants into our atmosphere.

A couple of months ago I had a member of the Columbia Gorge MG Club bring a totally failed camshaft and lifters back to me that had only 900 miles on them!! I immediately contacted the camshaft re-grinder (Delta Cam) and asked how this could happen. They were well aware of this problem as they were starting to have many failures of this type. In the past the lack of a molybdenum disulfide camshaft assembly lubricant at assembly was about the only thing that could create this type of problem. My customer has assembled many engines and had lubricated the camshaft properly. Then the bad news came out: It's today's "modem" API (American Petroleum Industry) approved oils that are killing our engines: Meaning all flat tappet (cam follower) equipped engines, as used in all BMC products, all British Leyland products, most pushrod engines prior to 1980, early Volvos, American high-performance engines and many others.

Next call: To a major camshaft supplier, both stock and performance (Crane). They now have an additive for whatever oil you are using during break-in so that the camshaft and lifters won't fail in an unreasonably short period of time. They also suggest using a diesel rated oil on flat tappet engines.

Next call: To a racing oil manufacturer that we use for the race cars (Red Line Oil). Their response: "We are well aware of the problem and we still use the correct amounts of those additives in our products". They continued to tell me they are not producing API approved oils so they don't have to test and comply. Their oils were NOT the "new, improved and approved" ones that destroy flat tappet engines! "We just build the best lubricants possible". Sounds stupid, doesn't it, New-Approved but inferior products, but it seems to be true for our cars.

To top this off: our representative from a major supplier of performance and street engine parts (EPWI) stopped by to "warn us" of the problem of the NEW oils on flat tappet engines. This was a call that the representative was making only because of this problem to warn their engine builders! "The reduction of the zinc, manganese and phosphates are causing very early destruction of cams and followers". They are recommending that, for now at least, there must be a proper oil additive put in the first oil used on new engines beyond the liberal use of molydisulfide assembly lube. They have been told that the first oil needs the additive but remain skeptical that the first oil is all that is necessary. Their suggestion is to use diesel rated oils such as Delo or Rotella that are usually) available at auto stores and gas stations.

This problem is BIG! American Engine Rebuilder's Association (AER) Bulletin #TB2333 directly addresses this problem. I had a short discussion with their engineer and he agreed with all that I had been finding.

Next phone call was to a retired engineer from Clevite, a major bearing and component manufacturer. The first surprise was that he restored older British Motor bikes. The second surprise was that he was "VERY" aware of this problem because many of the old bikes had rectangular tappets that couldn't rotate and are having a very large problem with the new oils. NOW He has written an article for the British Bike community that verify all the "bad news" we have been finding. ' HAT D

Comp Cams put out "#225 Tech Bulletin: Flat Tappet Camshafts". They have both an assembly lube and an oil additive. The telling sentence in the bulletin was "While this additive was originally developed specifically) for break-in protection, subsequent testing has proven the durability benefits of its long term use. This special blend of additives promotes proper breakin and protects against premature cam and lifter failure by replacing some of the beneficial ingredients that the oil companies have been required to remove from the "off the shelf oil".

Next question: Now what do we do?

From the camshaft re-grinders (DeltaCam) "Use oils rated for diesel use", Delo (Standard Oil product) was named. About the same price as other quality petroleum based oils. They have the ZDDP we need in weights we are familiar with.

From one camshaft manufacturer (Crane): "use our additive" for the first 500 miles.

From General Motors (Chevrolet): add EOS, their oil fortifier, to your oil, it's only an 8-ounce can (This problem seems to be something GM has known about for some time!). The additive says for break-in only, some dealers add it to every oil change.

From Redline Oil: Use our street formulated synthetics. They have what we need! Early in 2007 they will be supplying a "break-in oil" specifically for our cars.

From Castro!: We are beginning to see a pattern emerging

on older cars. It may be advantageous to use a non approved lubricant, such as oils that are Diesel rated, 4 Cycle Motorcycle oils and other specified diesel oils. They will be supplying "new oils" specifically for our cars in early 2007.

For you science buffs: ZDDP is a single polar molecule that is attracted to Iron based metals. The one polar end tends to "Stand" the molecule up on the metal surface that it is bonded to by heat and friction. This forms a sacrificial layer to protect the base metals of the cam and tappet from contacting each other. Only at very high pressures on a flat tappet cam is this necessary because the oil is squeezed or wiped from the surface. This high pressure is also present on the gudgeon pin (wrist pin) in diesel engines, therefore the need for ZDDP in all diesel engines.

> The Second part of the equation is Molybdenum disulfide (Moly). The molybonds to the zinc adding

an additional, very slippery, sacrificial layer to the metal. I found out that too much of the moly will create problems; lack of this material reduces the effectiveness of the WDP. The percentage, by weight is from .01 to .02%, not much, but necessary according to the chemists.

Now there is no denying that there is a problem, lack of ZDDP (Zinc Dialkyl Dithiophosphate) in modem oils kills at least our cams and tappets. There seems to be no known alter-native.

Our cars are a small percentage of the total market and BIG Corporate, the American Petroleum Institute and possibly government have made decisions that are detrimental to our cars. This problem isn't going away. The trend today is to lighter weight oils to decrease drag, which increases mileage. Most of these seem to be the "Energy Conservation" oils that we can-not use.

Redline oil and others arc suggesting a 3,000 mile break-in for new engines! Proper seating of rings with today's lubricants is taking that long to properly seal.

Shifting to synthetics be-fore that time will just burn a lot of oil and not run as well as hoped.

The "Energy Conservation" trend was first led by automakers to increase mileage numbers and secondly because the ZDDP and other chemicals degrade the catalytic converter after extended miles, increasing pollution. Most of us don't have catalytic converters and the mileage gains are not that significant.

Many oil companies may have products that will continue to function well in our cars. Castrol, Redline, Valvoline, Mobil,



Shell, Amsoil and others have now commented on my original article and are making suggestions. Some companies are offering short lists of "acceptable" oils, others just one. One company has responded without any substantive information in a two page "bulletin". By their account all their oils are superior and applicable. This is typical of many companies.

Some oil manufacturers are pointing to metallurgy, blaming poorly built cams and followers. This may have some validity but the bottom line is that there has been a big increase in failures with products that have been on the market for many years but are now having greatly in-creased failures. To me the bottom line is, if the lubricants are working there is no contact be-tween surfaces, it shouldn't matter what the materials used in the products are, within reason.

On "modem" production cars, stay with the manufacturers' suggestions. For any car produced before about 1990 the owner needs to be aware that the factory suggested lubricant may have changed and may not be applicable. Flat tappet, stock, performance or modified may be affected. MGBs from 1975 to 1980 must choose to sacrifice the cam or the catalytic converter as an example of how difficult the decisions are becoming!

Yes, there is more! Castrol does understand our dilemma and is actively looking into what it can do to support our cars. We can soon expect to see products from them with specific application to classic cars. Red Line will be offering a "breakin" oil soon after the first of the year. Shell's Rotella will be good until about June or July of 2007 with possibly nothing after that date. Delo (Chevron) will also be questionable after the new "CJ-4" standards come in the middle of 2007. Now the important information, here are Oils that may be correct for our cars today:

(As reported by manufacturers by 2-18-07, NOTE: many have changed their recommendations over the last three months!)

Castrol Syntec "Classic" 20W-50 (available after April, 2007) TWS Motorsport: 10W-60* BMW: Long Life 5W-30* Red Line: 10W-30, 10W-40 (Synthetic oils) Valvoline: VR-1 20W-50 (Conventional oil) Amsoil: 20W-50 (TRO), 10W-40 (AMO), 15W-40 (AMC) & 20W-50 (ARO) Mobil: Mobil 1 5W-30 20W-50 (Synthetic) Chevron: Delo 400

Shell: Rotella

*full synthetic, available only at BMW dealerships

What we are doing at Foreign Parts Positively has been difficult to determine but with few options left, the following is what we are forced to do. Some of our choices have been based on the manufacturer's willingness to help and specific reports. This list will change in the next months with Castrol and Red Line adding products just for our cars.

• Break-in uses Delo 400 30W (a break-in oil will be available from Redline soon!) or Castrol HD-30 if it was produced before July 2006. We have some old stock of Castrol HD-30.




- Conventional oil is Valvoline VR-1 20W-50 or Castrol GTX-20w-50 if it was produced before July 2006. We have some old stock.
- Synthetic oil is Red Line 10W-30 in newer engines or 10W-40 in older engines.
- Break-in is now 3,000 miles before changeover to running oil.
- 1-year or 18,000 mile oil change interval with Red Line synthetic
- 1-year or 2,500 mile oil change interval with conventional oil (Valvoline VR-1 20W-50).

Thank you to Castrol, Redline, Christiansen Oil, Valvoline, Mobil, Shell, Standard Oil and Amsoil for input. We're sure this subject will continue: Please forward any new information on this subject that you may encounter.

We have received some very interesting material from "Mr Moly" that may be putting molybdenum disulfide (MoS) into this discussion. It seems that ZDDP plus MoS is the best from the oil companies' opinion but MoS by itself may be beneficial. Some racers swear by it. The literature seems to support "Mr. Moly's" position.

Press release from Lakeland College LAKELAND CELEBRATES ENERGY PARK SITE OFFICIAL OPENING

(Lloydminster, Alta.) – Lakeland College officially opened its Energy Park Site on April 18.

Dignitaries, industry partners, alumni, students, employees and friends of the college celebrated the opening of the three-acre industrial site just west of Lloydminster. The site includes two large buildings that now house Lakeland's street rod technologies (SRT) and truck driver training programs.

Lakeland acquired the Energy Park Site through the generosity of a private donor. Valued at \$2.7 million, it is the largest philanthropic gift in the college's history.

"We're thankful for this generous donation. With this wonderful addition our street rod technologies students are turning their passion for vehicles into rewarding careers and our truck driver training program finally has a permanent location," says Alice Wainwright- Stewart, Lakeland's president and CEO.

Donor Barry Anderson says the celebration is all about the college, the students, and this facility that they'll use for years to come. "I'm proud to be a part of it, but I was only one piece of a lot of moving parts to get to this point. What they've done to the site is amazing and unbelievable. I'm glad this has worked out for the college and for the younger generation to be able to have an educational facility like this."

Officially opening the Energy Park Site is significant for Lakeland's School of Trades and Technology and its students. "This innovative facility is filled with outstanding potential for Lakeland to grow its presence in industry, and to train students with current, industry-relevant programming," says Dave King, dean of the school.

"We've been able to increase our capacity for enrolment in our SRT program, as well as have all of the tools they need to excel under one roof and have additional space for them to keep their personal projects," King says. "For our truck driver training program, the location is its first permanent home. Before, we parked our trucks and trailers at either campus or in area parking lots. Now, our equipment is safely stored inside the north building at the Energy Park Site, shielded from the elements."


SRT students learn to customize and restore vehicles in this one-year certificate program. They learn about vehicle design, electrical systems, frames, suspension and more. Using specialized tools, students develop valuable skills in metal shaping, custom painting and welding, among others. In addition to finding employment in the restoration and fabrication industry, SRT graduates have the opportunity to challenge the auto body prepper apprenticeship exam. 
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

OUT OF PROVINCE INSPECTIONS -WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

S o you just inherited old Uncle Henry's classic car and want to bring it into Alberta so you drive it on special occasions a few times a year. When you went to register the car at your local Alberta Services outlet you found out that you need an OUT OF PROVINCE INSPECTION. When you questioned the boys at the local coffee stop, they regaled you with horror stories of the costs and work required to get this dreaded OOP inspection.

What do you do now?

Kevin Clark, a register mechanic, from the Lloydminster Auto Club has come with a list of items that can cause your vehicle to fail an OOP inspection. These are items that you can fix or have repaired on your timeline before you take the vehicle in for inspection.

Remember once your vehicle has failed to pass the OOP you have only 14 days to have it repaired before you have to start the whole inspection process over.

PRE- OUT OF PROVINCE INSPECTION Customer Check list.

- 1 Windshields cannot have a crack larger than a nickel (12mm) in size anywhere in the wiper path or a crack of 75mm anywhere else on the windshield.
- 2 No Aftermarket Tint is allowed on the windshield or the front drivers and passenger side windows.
- 3 All Lights and horns must be in operating condition and be DOT approved.
- 4 All lamps including headlamps cannot be broken or cracked and must not be discoloured or contain any moisture.

- 5 Tires must not protrude passed the wheel wells unless covered by Mud Flaps and/or Wheel Well Flares.
- 6 Tires must have no deep sidewall cracks and must have thread depth above the wear bars.
- 7 Rearview mirrors cannot be cracked, broken, discoloured or have loose mountings.
- 8 All Side Windows, Doors, Latches & Locks must operate properly.
- 9 HVAC must operate in all modes. (A/C does not have to be maintained or charged.
- 10 Instrument panel lighting and gauges must be operational.
- 11 No SES (check engine light), SRI, ABS, brake warning lights or warning messages should be present or illuminated when driving. (excludes TPM) Note: All vehicles equipped vehicles will be scanned for DTC's during an inspection.
- 12 No severe brake pulsation or brake lead must be present.
- 13 The steering wheel must be centered and the vehicle must steer properly without side pull.
- 14 Wheels must not be out of balance.
- 15 Windshield wipers and windshield washers must be operational
- 16 Seats & interior must be all secure.
- 17 No exhaust leaks or inadequate mufflers are allowed.

Note: Vehicles that are legible for antique status (25 years or older) will be inspected as per original or period correct regarding lights, mirrors, windshield wipers and washers, seatbelt,etc. It is well worthwhile to have documented proof of the accessaries for the inspector.

Kevin also noted that as a garage they are more than happy to repair any of the above issues but as an additional cost over the Out of Province Inspection fee.

People turned out in such numbers that even the roadways on the lot were full.) Many towns and cities made similar proclamations. Malcolm Fischer, an SVAA director, encouraged Stettler to take part and they did. Jim Herbert lobbied the City of Calgary and was successful. Many others did similar things.

The day of recognition accomplishes a number of things. It acknowledges the work of the hobbyists in the building/preservation/maintenance of their vehicles. It further recognizes the extensive network of businesses supporting the hobby and providing employment across the province. Working with provincial officials has enhanced their understanding of the hobby and it place in Alberta. The SVAA, in bringing the request for the proclamation to the province has made this the message at all of our meetings. Jim Herbert is pleased with the response from the provincial officials.

CCAD Events

The SVAA's message is to hold an event celebrating the day in your area. Let people see your beloved vehicle and begin to understand what the hobby does for all of us. Many of us cannot be at the provincial proclamations in Calgary and Edmonton. Ask your local politicians to recognize the day, invite them to the event and have fun.

SEMA is doing the the same on SEMA Action Network's (SAN) website. For those unable to celebrate on July 13, SEMA encourages events to be scheduled throughout the month of July.






