



SVAA INSURANCE PACKAGE SUMMARY Top Notch Protection at Low Cost

Why do we, as specialty vehicle club people, have insurance?

One word: PROTECTION. The SVAA has, for many years, worked with its broker to provide a comprehensive insurance program to clubs at reasonable cost.

What do we get?

Our sanctioned events and meetings have General Liability coverage ranging from bodily injury and property damage to volunteer medical payments. It also includes setup and takedown at club events, all club meetings and events such as swap meets and fundraisers.

Further, the insurance company acts on our behalf and our member clubs when there is an incident. All volunteers and committees are covered. Our current limit is \$5,000,000.

If you are an Officer or Director of your club, you will want coverage. It is your responsibility in your role to act in a reasonable and prudent manner. That being said, in the litigious culture of today, directors and officers are being named in lawsuits even when they are not apparently involved. The SVAA insurance program covers the cost of your legal defence. Our current limit is \$1,000,000.00.

What does the SVAA insurance program cost us?

Using a club with 20 members as an example, the cost of insurance is \$110 per year. A Certificate of Insurance is sent to the club upon receipt of their application for membership. Additional Certificates covering specific events are provided as needed at no additional charge.

Insurance is available only to SVAA member clubs.



fter its introduction in Alberta last year, car communities gathered province-wide once again to celebrate Collector Car Appreciation Day on the second Friday in July. As before, the A&W at Glendeer Circle in Calgary was packed with cars spanning the decades and manufacturers, with this year's feature row around the podium consisting of convertibles.

The newly appointed Minister of Service Alberta, Brian Malkinson, understands the passion behind the hobby, as he has been a car guy and involved in the local scene for many years.

"I find it very relaxing to work on my cars and have done so long before I became an MLA, and will continue even now that I am in my new portfolio. Car appreciation is all about enjoying a hobby that brings automotive enthusiasts together."

His classic car is a 1971 Olds Cutlass S, 461 ci (455+30 over) big block with dual 4-barrel carbs, TKO600 5-speed transmission, and bench seats. It has seen new paint and the auto-to-manual ransmission conversion done by himself in his garage.

Minister Malkinson acknowledged the important contributions that car collectors make to our province.

"They preserve history, support local communities, and contribute to the economy by maintaining and showing these classic and vintage cars."



The evening's festivities ended just in time, as moments later while cars were heading out, an intense dust storm hit suddenly. It was a wild

he love of restoration and bringing the past to life resonates beyond the automotive world for the River City Classics Car Club. They have lovingly brought the Eamon's Garage, an iconic feature on 1A Highway (then) west of Calgary, back to life. Its new home rests on the Agricultural grounds beside the Call of the West Museum in High River, Alberta.

The garage had been left in storage in Stavely Alberta by the City of Calgary in 2012 and was rescued in 2015 by the intrepid group of car enthusiasts. It was, as you can imagine, in dire need of much love and attention after spending years left in the storage yard.

We are about to take a walk down memory lane from the beginnings of Eamon's Garage to the present day. Do join us...

1949 to 1966

Gas stations dot the landscape in Calgary, but the Eamon station's Art Deco meets Streamline Moderne design is certainly amongst the most noteworthy, or at least it was before it was placed in city storage in 2012.

The station was a key component of Eamon's Camp, a site that started with a drive-in diner in 1949 and grew with the years to incorporate the Texaco dealership known as the Eamon Station as well as a 12-room bungalow camp, eventually becoming what Eamon's called a one-stop tourist centre. It was a popular stop for gas, meals and accommodation for people on their way west to Canmore, Banff and beyond.

The restaurant was destroyed after it caught fire in 1961 and the opening of a nearby section of the Trans-Canada highway in 1966 prompted the closing of the station when Texaco was unable to acquire the proper licenses to work off the highway.

Here is a look back at the Eamon's development.

- **1949:** Roy Eamons opens what was the first drive-in restaurant in Calgary
- **1952:** The Texaco dealership is built called "Eamon's Super Service Station"
- 1955: The twelve room Eamon's Bungalow Camp opens. Roy Eamon calls his various businesses' a"One stop tourist Centre"
- **1966:** The new Trans-Canada Highway opens drastically reducing traffic passing the site and Eamon's closes for good.
- **2018:** The sign for the Eamon's Camp is still visible across from the Tuscany C-Train station on Crowchild Trail. The last remaining building, Eamon's Garage, is at the Call of the West Museum in High River where it is nearing the completion of a loving restoration.

The evening sun is casting a warm glow over the cars as I balance on crutches and watch my fellow car enthusiasts mill around, visiting and laughing, catching up after a long winter. Only a few months ago, I didn't think I would even be here...

Since falling on ice in mid-February and shattering my fibula as well as breaking and dislocating my ankle on my left leg, daily living has become much more challenging than I could have imagined. A cane for the stairs in my 4-level split, a walker on each level, crutches for short distances, and a wheelchair for shopping clutter up my house and cars but for now it's how I get around and will be for a while yet. Even putting on shoes and socks had to be relearned so as not to put pressure on the hardware in my leg.

Lying in a hospital bed recovering from surgery, one of my first thoughts was that it was winter and I had lots of time to prepare for car season. Six weeks and I'll be on crutches – that's what the Internet said but it was wrong.

The break was so bad that even with 2 long plates held in place by a dozen smaller screws and one giant screw joining my fibula and tibia (wonder if it's Phillips or Robertson), my leg still wasn't structurally sound enough to even put on the ground, so as a result, I was wheelchair bound for 9 weeks before I could even partially weight bear, so an orthopedic hospital became my home.

As spring started to approach I began to worry but as each

snowfall happened, I said a silent "Yes!!" as I knew no one else would be able to drive their classics. As the time neared for Spring Thaw though I became restless. Still in a wheelchair and unable to walk, I certainly couldn't go and no one would want to take me as my chair was not small and I didn't imagine anyone would risk damage to their car.

A few days before came a most welcome message. A caring friend wanted to take me so I could escape the hospital for the day, but my spirits sank the next day when the show was cancelled due to expected inclement weather. The months of confinement were starting to take their toll on me. I spent the Sunday curled up on the bed watching the raindrops cascade down my window as the bustle of nurses and visitors carried on outside my lonely room.

During the next week I was finally given the go ahead to use crutches with my air cast and while I still needed my wheelchair, the weather co-operated this time and the kindness of friends enabled me to make a trip out to Airdrie for

the first show of the season. What a joy to be with my car family again, many of them being unaware of my accident.

I stayed in my wheelchair most of the day but took a few brave steps on the very hilly parking lot pavement. Distances of a hundred feet were all I could manage before my good leg and my arms ached.

Venturing out into my familiar world led to challenges I didn't think about last year. Need to use a washroom? Impossible to get a wheelchair over a curb so I had to roll an extra distance to find a ramp. Time for lunch? Can't carry a hotdog and drink in my lap without making a mess, so I needed someone to carry it for me. Look in

the car windows? Nope. The cars on display were parked too close to get a wheelchair in between, so all I could view were the front bumpers. Though my activities were limited, being with friends in the sunshine after almost three months in the hospital made for a wonderful day.

I was getting antsy to start driving again, but the big cast on my leg said no and my Thunderbird was still in storage. Fortunately my son and a good friend took the car out and over to the shop and soon it was ready.

I finally got the all clear from the surgeon to remove the air cast and start putting full weight on my foot in shoes with the aid of crutches so I could leave the wheelchair at the hospital for the A&W season opener. I was very nervous during the week leading up to it. I know the layout well – sloping lot, high curbs, heavy bathroom entrance doors, small booths, high stools – all very frightening for someone still trying to find their balance on crutches. Full weight bearing doesn't mean just walking like normal; after 12 weeks in a cast nothing moves or works very well. I had to practice walking again and learn to do stairs with limited mobility.

The day arrived and I could barely contain my excitement. I had told many of my fellow patients about my car and they had seen it in the magazine I kept on my bedside tray, but now I got to show them in person. My son came to pick me up in the TBird and as I saw the familiar grill round the corner to the front entrance of the hospital, I heard a few oohs and aahs. It was quite a fun scene – me on crutches, one on a walker, and several in wheelchairs circling the car to look inside and out. The evening turned out great even though I had some trouble getting around all the obstacles and broke out in a nervous sweat each time I had to go up and down the curb.

The next week I was released from my hospital habitat. 91 days away from home. Three months and two days is a long time to be gone especially when home is only ten miles away but completely unsafe as long as I was in a cast and unable to navigate stairs. The first thing I did when I got

home was collapse in my big chair and take in the familiar surroundings. I made it.

Now that I was home I could start to focus on car season and how I was going to participate.

The next event to prepare for was Thunderbird Appreciation Day. As the club president this was one event I did not want to miss, but this was a trip out to Black Diamond and I hadn't sat in a car for that length of time since last year. Once again my son was behind the wheel, allowing me to settle in on the smooth leather bench seat in the

back, leg up on a cushion, hidden from others by the large landau behind the rear doors so I felt like I was riding in a limousine!

While the lunch was great, the steps into the diner were steep, the booths were tight, the bathroom quite small, and the waiter bumped into my extended leg, sending shockwaves through me. Ouch! I was getting better at navigating on my crutches though so it wasn't as tough as the week before.

Having my son drive me to events was helpful, but I had less than a week to start driving solo again and get ready for an upcoming show very important to me – Driven. I started practicing in my Focus over to the corner store, then the coffee shop down the way. Every day a little bit further. Driving was becoming comfortable and manageable, as all my cars are automatics, but getting in and out of the car not so much.

The big day came and the two of us headed for the Olym-

pic Oval. Driven, an aftermarket performance show, is a two-day event – roll in and set up Friday with the show on Saturday. I wasn't worried about driving my 240SX there; it was the hours of setup and a full day of the show. Lunch was several hundred feet away from my assigned parking spot and the washrooms even further. The familiar tic-toc sound of my crutches was heard throughout the day as I slowly navigated my way around the Oval between rest periods in my heavy-duty lawn chair or 4-wheeled walker. Thank goodness

for extra strength Tylenols. A few more car shows have come and gone – Three Hills, Wetaskiwin, Airdrie – and it's getting marginally better each time. Wetaskiwin was a personal achievement; I made a weekend of it and stayed by myself in a hotel. I had called ahead for a handicapped room that had grab bars and open spaces to navigate with my crutches and cane. Getting up at 4 am and coming home the same day for the show just wasn't possible in my current state, and I made sure I had companions travelling on the highway with me in both directions. I will continue to travel with friends each time I venture out of the city limits for my safety, and besides, it's more fun to travel in a group anyways.

I see my journey this past spring not as an unfortunate break (pardon the pun), but as a positive experience. I made new life-long friends, learned to pilot a wheelchair with great skill (getting awesome biceps along the way), challenged myself in physiotherapy every day, discovered how mentally



and physically strong I am, gained valuable insights on life from a handicapped persons point of view, as well as fun things like crocheting a blanket and sharpening my cribbage skills. While a painful and grueling incident at times, I don't regret having gone through it, as I have learned so much and have some interesting stories and pictures to share. Want to see my X-rays? Just ask!

t the Calgary Spring Gun Show in 2013 some like-minded individuals started kicking around some ideas about starting a club. This lead to our first meeting on June 16, 2013. This will sound familiar to anyone who has started a club. But we had another goal. We wanted to get twelve members so we could be an official affiliate of the Military Vehicle Preservation Association. The MVPA is an international organization with 8,000 members. With fourteen members, we began the process of forming an executive, coming up with a name, setting dues, meeting locations and designing our logo etc .

The Prairie Motor Brigade is a family-oriented club dedicated to the acquisition, restoration, display and enjoyment of historic military vehicles. We strive to honor



the many veterans who operated these vehicles in the past. We accomplish this by our preservation efforts, educating those interested in the historical significance and service of our vehicles, taking in Legion events, annual town parade participation, Remembrance Day event involvement, military museum support etc. Our members own and restore vehicles from all wars ranging from motorcycles to tanks and five-ton trucks to jeeps. We also collect militaria to enhance our vehicle displays. You do not need to own a vehicle to join, just an interest is all you need.

As our club matured, we wanted to do more for veterans. Thus, we adopted the Canadian Legacy Project as our official charity. You will find their donation box at all our events. The Canadian Legacy Project's programs focus on employment, housing, PTSD service dogs, food, education and mental health of our Canadian veterans. They are all volunteers and 100% of all donations go to veterans. Donations over \$20 receive a tax receipt.

We have numerous events throughout the year – Summer Skirmish at The Military Museum, our Annual Military Vehicle Display and Swap Meet in Red Deer, Remembrance Day service at The Military Museum, Convoy to the British Military Training Centre, displays at the Hangar Museum in Calgary and Nanton Bomber Command Museum. We have also taken part in the changing of command at two military bases here in Alberta. Due to the uniqueness of our vehicles, their size and transportability, the normal SVAA Safety form poses a problem for us. We therefore modified the form and require all our members who bring vehicles to a rolling event to present a completed Safety form.





INSPIRING OTHERS TO FOLLOW THEIR DREAMS

Automotive enthusiasts the world over are surely familiar with the traditional forms of media associated with the hobby, namely magazines and television shows. As technology has changed and progressed though, new forms of sharing and consuming content have arrived as well - websites, blogs, and even YouTube channels.



The latter – YouTube – is the platform that one group of friends from Calgary have utilized and committed themselves to, taking what was an initial idea a few years ago and turning it into what is now a channel with just over 160,000 subscribers (at the time of this writing) and a full-time job.

LOWCALS, as they are known, consists of David, Jesse, Charles, Devon, Jay, and Brandon, and originally started – in name at least – back in 2014. With inspiration from another Calgary-based automotive group (ill.motion), the guys wanted to make a recognizable team for attending shows, meets, and other events together. The following year a YouTube channel was created to allow the sharing of their experiences, and after they started a more regular upload schedule their channel experienced rapid growth through the end of that year and into 2016.

In August of 2016, LOWCALS hit what could be considered the first major milestone for YouTube channels – 100,000 subscribers! YouTube rewards milestones like this by gifting the channels' creators with "Play Buttons" as they're called; silver, gold, and diamond for 100,000, one million, and 10 million subscribers respectively. LOWCALS' silver Play Button sits on display in their workshop as a reminder of their achievement, and as motivation to work towards the next.

The channel's video content centers around what LOW-CALS are up to, be it working on automotive projects, attending local events, or travelling around Canada and the USA to meet other YouTube channel creators and car enthusiasts. With a preference for no staging, fancy special effects, or excessive post-production, the guys like to bring a raw look at their adventures; a first-hand look at everything that makes up their experiences within the automotive community. David states that "simplicity and passion is a formula that has proven to be successful for us. The fact that many of our viewers have reached out to us because of our videos - letting us know we inspired them to save for their dream car, start a project car, or start a YouTube channel - is truly humbling and inspires us to just keep working harder."

A large part of their content and identity also has to do with Japanese Domestic Market (JDM) vehicles as many of their projects are imported, right-hand drive vehicles like Nissan Skylines. Due to Canada's import laws, LOWCALS and many other enthusiasts get to enjoy owning and driving



these cars whereas in other countries – such as the United States – some or all of these vehicles are still ineligible for import.

There's more to it than just cars however. LOWCALS as a brand fo-

cuses around inspiration; the guys are following their dreams and passions, and strive to inspire others to do the same. They wish to "create a community of like-minded individuals and share our passions together", says David.

Alongside their projects, travels, and creating videos, the guys also design and sell merchandise for LOWCALS ranging from clothing, to decals, and other items between. Expansion into automotive accessories is also being explored as they continue to grow.

Altogether, the various aspects of running a YouTube channel and its associated brand result in a weekly schedule with a lot of variety. When asked what an average day is like, the answer is that defining an average is easier said than done. One day they could be working on their cars while filming for an upcoming video, whereas the next they could be discuss-


and reach, and on yet another be designing new decals or clothing items.

Looking back on the adventure of running the channel, David notes that "the cool thing about a YouTube channel is that it acts as a digital archive of memories and good times with friends". When asked to pick out a favourite moment from the past few years, he replied that there have simply been too many amazing experiences to single any out.

While YouTube may be a newer and different take on automotive media, that's perhaps one important aspect that it shares with the traditional forms; it serves as an archive of memories, and as LOWCALS keep on growing their brand and creating more videos for other enthusiasts to enjoy, that archive will only continue to grow as well.

Originally started by Justin Nupoort of Menace Rides, the Menace Meets were established a few years ago as the successors to a previous weekly meet series in Calgary. He wanted a positive place for local enthusiasts to hang out and be able to enjoy the hobby, and worked to find a venue that would not only provide enough space but also one that wouldn't be negatively impacted by regular - and sizable - gatherings of vehicles.



Held in the parking lot at the (SE) corner of Blackfoot Trail and 46th Avenue SE in Calgary, rain or shine each week sees a solid turnout of vehicles and enthusiasts. As they officially begin at 7PM, most of the businesses will be closed for the evening which allows for just about the entirety of the parking lot to be utilized for the meets; still open, however, are Tim Hortons – providing a caffeine fix for attendees – as well as Mary Brown's, who even offer discounts on their meals for anyone who is there for Menace.

Originally very "tuner" -centric gatherings, as word has gotten out and other meets and events have wrapped up, there has been a notable shift in the makeup of vehicles in the lot each week. These days everything from trucks, to Japanese imports, to classic American muscle cars (and more) can be found mixed together, and likewise you can find show cars next to daily drivers; anything and everything is welcome and the variety means that there will be something for everyone.

As vehicles enter off of the main road there will usually be a small crowd of onlookers watching the new arrivals, alongside some local photographers snapping away as the cars drive past. From there, due to the constant arrival and departure of vehicles all night mixed with the sheer number that attend, finding a place to park can sometimes feel like a game of musical chairs – but it speaks to the meets' success. On busier nights it's not long before all of the stalls have been filled and vehicles are being parked in the aisles or even around the sides of the buildings; it makes for quite a spectacle on those nights, and certainly beats the alternative!

So, if you're looking for somewhere to go on a Wednesday evening why not make your way over to a Menace Meet? You can pick up dinner, grab some coffee, and join the fun; but get there early!


