DEVELOPING SAFE DRIVING HABITS

Humans are creatures of habit.

This article describes what I have done to develop safe driving habits whenever I'm behind the wheel.

Every day I would see drivers using turn signals poorly (or not at all), exceeding posted speed limits, not coming to complete stops at intersections, and following too close behind other drivers. I was guilty by varying degrees of all of this.

The first thing I did was started driving the speed limit. Not that I drove excessively fast, but I was known to exceed the limit. I soon realized that I was getting angry at other drivers for going too slow, resulting in aggravation. Now driving has become much more relaxing. I have lots of room ahead of me because everyone else was going faster. I'm doing the speed limit and not tailgating two birds with one stone.

Slowing down resulted in more tailgaters – many more than before. I believe the movie is 'The Gumball Rally', a race across the U.S from Times Square to the Pacific Ocean. An Italian driver ripped the rear view mirror from his sports car and said "The first rule of Italian driving, what's behind me is not important". This was a major part of my attitude adjustment. I used to get angry at tailgaters and would slow down, flash my brake lights, or apply my brakes, not to mention muttering a few unkind words. I now could care less about them because if they hit me…it's their fault, and if they want to speed, go around me.

I now come to complete stops at signs and lights. I'm sure some drivers get angry at me for doing this... but I don't care. (another part of my attitude adjustment).

I used to turn on my signals and turn the wheel at the same time...not any more. Some drivers seem to have forgotten altogether what that lever is on the left side of the steering column does. They change lanes, turn corners and pull out into traffic without signalling at all. Others turn on the signal at the same time as they change lanes. This almost always requires the driver behind them to jam on the brakes. I now turn on the signal lights well ahead of changing lanes or turning corners. This gives other drivers a good heads up on what I intend to do. I have noticed that other drivers now make room for me now to change lanes...more so if I'm in the hot rod. When changing lanes, I leave lots of room between myself and the car behind me so they are not tailgating me.

I also use the turn signals in 'turn only' lanes. This helps develop a habit of using them whenever I'm turning. (Refer to the first line of the article.)

As I said earlier, my outcome is that I find driving is much more relaxing. The hardest part of this whole thing was changing my attitude. It took a little time but I'm less frustrated and enjoy driving much more than I did before.

• The NAACC asked for Club support in 2018 to help ward off a proposed 25% import tax on vehicles imported to the USA from abroad and Canada. Unfortunately, very few Clubs or members made the effort or took the time to provide impute on the Government survey website even though we contacted you. It was truly disappointing. The ramification is that 'if' this legislation passes it will be much harder to sell your Canadian vehicles into the USA as there will be a 25% import tax imposed on the purchaser based on the selling price. We are all holding our breath.
